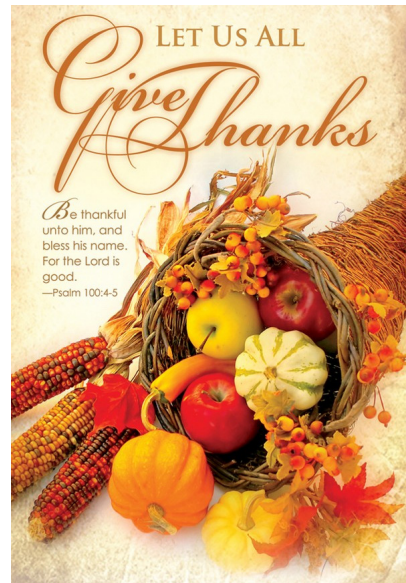

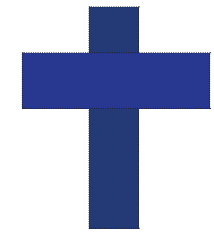

INTRODUCTION TO THE LITURGY OF THE DAY!

FIRST READING: Proverbs 31:10 - 13, 19 - 20, 30 - 31

A worthy wife has value for beyond pearls. She deserves payment for her labor and praise for her work: "Let her works praise her at the city gates."

SECOND READING: 1 Thessalonians 5:1 - 6

According to Paul, Christians are children of light. They belong not to dark not to night but, rather, to day and light. They should be awake, sober, and alert.

GOSPEL READING: Matthew 25:14 - 30

Jesus told the parable about a man who went on a journey and gave his servants money. On his return, he said to the one who made the greatest profit, "Well done ... I will give you great responsibilities."

Our first reading introduces us to a woman of extraordinary skills, who uses her gifts both at home and out in the world, where she reaches out her hands to the poor. When we listen to the Gospel that follows, we can more easily visualize how God expects us to use the talents we have been given, not just to enrich ourselves or our employers, but to make the world a better place.

LITURGY AND WORD

The hearers of today's parable must have been shocked by the severe treatment given to the servant who buried his talent. After all, he did nothing wrong. He only lacked boldness, the courage to risk. In fact, according to the Jewish law of the time, a person entrusted with a sum of money for safekeeping fulfilled his obligation if he buried the money. In those days the safest place to put precious coins was in the ground. The servant in the parable was punished for doing just that! Or was he punished only for that? The master accused him to be a 'wicked' and 'slothful' servant. We can understand he was slothful because he did not care to invest or make use of the talent he had received. But why was he called 'wicked'? It was because he had no respect for the master and his wealth. His relationship with the master was not of the right kind. He said, "Master, I knew you to be a hard man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you did not winnow." He understood his master as a cruel and exacting man. He did not know him as a benevolent and merciful one, in spite of the trust the master had placed in him by entrusting him with his money. He had no love for the master. He only feared him, and that fear led him to bury the master's money. God has invested talent in each one of us. God looks at our abilities and sees not just who we are, but who we can become and what we can accomplish for His glory. The talents are not given to us for safekeeping. We have the potential to develop our talents. In fact, God has given us talents with His hope that we will succeed and be fruitful and bring glory to Him. The history books are full of stories of gifted persons whose talents were overlooked by a procession of people until someone believed in them. To name a few ... Einstein was four years old before he could speak and seven before he could read. But he went on to become one of the greatest physicists ever lived. Isaac Newton did poorly in grade school but like Einstein he became one of the smartest people of his day as a scientist. A newspaper fired Walt Disney because he had "no good ideas." In the beginning he couldn't sell his cartoons. Finally he found a minister who paid him a small amount to draw advertising pictures for his church. Disney had no place to stay, so that the church let him sleep in a mouse-infested garage. One of those mice which Disney nicknamed Mickey became

became famous — as the world knows. Leo Tolstoy flunked out of college. But later on he wrote the literature classic that we know as "War and Peace." Evidently, Jesus' story was not concerned only with monetary treasure. He was speaking of the spiritual treasures. God's gifts are entrusted to us to be used. A person who is interested only in preserving God's gifts will end up losing them altogether. The parable is exceptionally relevant also for our times. The rapid pace of change in today's world is deeply disturbing to many of us. People who feel the ground giving way beneath their feet cling desperately to the religious practices of their youth. Of course, the essential core of our faith has not changed, cannot and will not change. But in a constantly changing world, the way we express and live this faith does change and must change. Otherwise our faith would soon become like an exhibit in a museum, something to be admired, perhaps, but not a living, present reality with meaning for life today. People who are concerned solely with preserving the faith are like the man who buried his master's treasure in the ground. Jesus Christ who challenged the religious Establishment of his day challenges us today to live and express our faith in ways that belong unmistakably to our times.
