INTRODUCTION TO THE LITURGY OF THE DAY! FIRST READING: Leviticus 13:1 - 2, 44 - 46

•According to the law of Moses, people with leprosy had to live alone, outside the camp. Aaron or another priest declared them unclean as long as they had a disease.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 10:31 - 11:1

•Paul wrote to the Corinthians, "Do everything for the glory of God. Avoid giving offense, whether to the Jews or Greeks or the church of God ... Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ."

GOSPEL READING: Mark 1:40 - 45

*A leper said to Jesus, "If you wish, you can make me clean." Moved with pity, "Jesus touched him: "I do will it. Be made clean." The leprosy left him, and he was healed.

•Leprosy features prominently in the first reading and the Gospel today. In Leviticus, the leper is kept outside the community so as to protect everyone else from this communicable disease. But the leper in Mark challenges Jesus and Jesus breaks down the barrier between them, reaches out, touches him, and heals him. As we listen to today's readings, consider how we exclude others •in our lives, perhaps because we feel they would make us "unclean," and how Jesus would respond.

LITURGY AND WORD

According to Leviticus 13:45-46

the person with a leprous disease should wear torn clothes and have dishevelled hair, and should live alone in a dwelling "outside the camp, and cry out 'unclean, unclean.'" Physical contact with such people rendered a healthy person "unclean" too. The law stipulates that the leprous person should remain unclean as long as he has the disease and should dwell alone in a habitation outside the camp. Leprosy in the strict sense seems to have spread to the Near East from India ca. 300 B.C., and so it could have existed in Palestine at the time of Jesus. Leprosy was thought to be like death most likely because of the paleness of the person and the isolation from community, and a cure of leprosy was considered as stupendous as raising the dead (Num 12:10-12; 2 Kgs 5:7). The gospel narrative depicts vividly the humanity of Jesus. When confronted with a leper Jesus acts with a deep feeling of compassion, and touches him, thereby affirming his shared humanity and incurring ritual defilement himself. Though Jesus violates the purity laws by touching the leper, he orders the leper to obey the legal prescriptions on verification and cleansing. The man who is cleansed in turn violates the command of Jesus to be silent. Commands and prescriptions seem to have little power in this narrative. Rather, the humanity and the compassion of Jesus and the experience of freedom that the healed man enjoys are the main focus of attention.

This leper recognizes Jesus as a person who can cure him, "If you will, you can make me clean." The man's request assumes that Jesus embodies the power and will of God. Jesus commands that the person be healed and instantly the healing takes place. Next, the man from such a miserable existence emerged as a missionary preacher. From a situation in which he was totally isolated on account of his illness, he became a messenger of the good news. He did this in spite of being told that he should present

himself before the priest and receive the certificate of his healing. There is no indication that the healed man obeyed Jesus' command to go to the priest. Rather, he began to proclaim energetically and to spread the word widely. Further, the healed man, like the four disciples, joined Jesus in his mission. While the four chosen disciples were still training to be fishers of men, the cleansed leper was already contributing to the missionary catch. This miracle placed at the beginning of the gospel, is an indication to the reader that being called to the service of the gospel every person can be a missionary.
