

INTRODUCTION TO THE LITURGY OF THE DAY!

FIRST READING: Acts 4:8 - 12

Peter explained to the people that every good deed and all restoration to health are accomplished in the name of Christ Jesus the Nazorean, through whom all are saved.

SECOND READING: 1 John 3:1 - 2

*Believers are the dearly beloved children of God who do not yet know what shall come to light. When it does come to light, believers will be like God.

GOSPEL READING: John 10:11 - 18

Jesus is the good shepherd who knows the sheep. The Good Shepherd not only loves and protects the sheep but is willing to lay down his life for the sheep. In the first reading, we hear Peter preaching about Jesus again. He uses the line from Psalm 118 - "The stone rejected by the builders has become the corner-stone" - to describe Jesus. This becomes the refrain for the psalm. We then thear from John in the second reading and the Gospel, comforting us with the image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd and us as the children of God. Let us consider the richness of these images as we listen to them today.

LITURGY AND WORD

Shepherding was one of man's earliest occupations. Flocks and herds, always a prominent feature in Palestine and other Near Eastern Societies, consisted specifically of cows, sheep and goats. The principal animal, however, owing to size, abundance, and usefulness, was the sheep.

Possession of these animals indicated power and wealth; Job had thousands of sheep, camels, oxen and she-asses (Jb 42:12), and Abraham's flocks, herds, camels and asses were counted among his blessings (Gen 24:35). At the dedication of the temple, Solomon sacrificed innumerable sheep and oxen (1 Kgs 8:5). The principal duty of the shepherd was to see that the animals found enough food and water (cf. Psalm 23); and it was important that he guard the sheep, since they were easy prey for wild animals (Am 3:12). There was also the danger that thieves might sneak among the sheep and carry them off (Jn 10:1). The good shepherd was especially concerned about the condition of the flock, careful that the animals may not be overdriven (cf. Gen 33:13-14); and he would sometimes carry helpless lambs in his arms (cf. Isa 40:11), or on his shoulders. At night, sheep were often kept in simple walled enclosures made from scrambled bushes, providing a minimum of protection from weather and enemies, or caves might have been used, affording the best protection (1 Sam 24:3). The work of the shepherd was essentially to keep the flock intact, counting each animal as it passed under his hand (Jer 33:12-13; Ezek 20:37). John 10:11-18 qualifies Jesus' shepherding activity with the following characteristics: As the Good Shepherd he is prepared to sacrifice his own life for the sake of the flock. This self-gift of the shepherd unto death for his sheep has no parallel in the Jewish texts that speak of the messianic shepherd. Jesus does not fit the model of the expected Davidic shepherd-messiah. In contrast to the self-gift of the Good Shepherd, the hireling flees in the face of danger, leaving the sheep

exposed to the murdering and scattering presence of the wolf. Already Jewish tradition has spoken of its false leaders as those who did not perform their God-given responsibilities, but left the people prey to the wolves (Cf. Jer 23:1-8; Ezek 34). The Good Shepherd gives his life for his sheep, whereas the hireling is only interested in personal gain. The reader links the hireling with "the Jews" who have repeatedly refused to accept Jesus' claims that he is from God, that he will return to God, and that he makes God known. Jesus further astounds his audience by announcing that there are other sheep who are not "of this fold." Gentiles will be brought into the fold so that there will be one shepherd, and one fold. The idea of one shepherd leading one people of God came from the biblical tradition and continued in later Jewish literature, but something more is claimed by Jesus. He does not abandon the traditional image of the good shepherd, but he expands it in a way unknown to the Jewish tradition. The Good Shepherd lays down his life for his sheep because of the union between himself and the Father. The world outside Israel will be drawn into the fold of Jesus through his willing gift of himself unto death (v. 16).
