

After having reflected on Jesus as the Good Shepherd, the gospel of today presents Jesus as the True Wine. The common grapevine is mentioned throughout Scripture, often in a figurative sense. The mountain regions of Judea and Samaria, largely unsuited for grain, were well adapted for vine growing. A vineyard was usually surrounded by a protecting wall of stones or thorny hedges to keep out destructive animals. In every vineyard was a tower for the watchman, a winepress hollowed out of a flat rock, and a vat into which the juice flowed from the vine press. Vines required constant care to keep them productive. They were pruned every spring, and the ground was ploughed and kept free of weeds. Pruned branches were gathered and burned. During the harvest season watchmen were stationed in the towers, and sometimes the whole family of the owner took their residence in booths as a protection against thieves. The harvest season was always one of special happiness. Figuratively, the vine symbolized prosperity and peace among the ancient Hebrews. The vine also symbolized the chosen people, who instead of producing good fruit yielded only wild grapes. What does the symbolism of bearing and not bearing fruit mean? Spontaneously one tends to interpret the imagery in terms of good works and a virtuous life. For John love and keeping the commandments are so much a part of the life coming from faith that one who does not behave in a virtuous manner does not have life at all. True life is committed life. Therefore, a branch that does not bear fruit is not simply a living, unproductive branch, but a dead branch. Some may find this interpretation harsh since it holds out no hope for the unproductive branches; and also in Johannine teachings there is not much room for an intermediate stage: there are only living and dead branches. Augustine captures this dualism in his rhyming Latin epigram: "Aut vitis, aut ignis" (either the vine or the fire). In the atmosphere of the Last Supper Judas may be thought of as a branch that did not bear fruit; he is now a tool of Satan and belongs to the realm of darkness (Jn. 13:2, 27, 30). Jesus provides the unique source of life and fruitfulness. Jesus introduces the Father, the vinedresser who cares for the well-being and fruitfulness of the vine. The metaphor of the vine and the vinedresser is best understood in light of the everyday reality of vines and ine-keeping. Such practices help us

to understand what Jesus is saying about the Father and himself, and ultimately about discipleship. The Father cares for the fruitful branch on the vine, pruning it so that it will become more fruitful, and he destroys the branch that bears no fruit by separating it from the vine. Jesus is the life-giving vine but it's the Father who promotes growth and decides on the destruction of the unfruitful branches. However, this life-giving bond with the vine must not be taken for granted. The prophecies of the betrayal of Judas and the denials of Peter have shown that the life of union has begun but not perfected. It is not enough to be with him and to have received his word; they must abide in him and he will abide in them. No branch can ever bear fruit if it is separated from the vine, and no disciple will ever bear fruit alone. It is only by mutual abiding, the disciple in Jesus and Jesus in the disciple, that fruitfulness can take place.

To bear fruit means the disciples should do something. That "something" has already been summarized in the command to love, which Jesus taught would be the hallmark of his disciples. There is only one mission shared by the Son and his disciples. In this one mission the Father is glorified.
