INTRODUCTION TO THE LITURGY OF THE DAY!

FIRST READING: Wisdom 1:13 - 15; 2:23 - 24

God did not make death and does not delight when life is destroyed. All creatures of the world are wholesome. Through the devil's envy, death entered the world.

GOSPEL READING: Mark 5:21 - 43

When Jesus was on His way to heal Jairus's daughter, a woman touched His cloak and was healed of her sickness. Jesus told the woman, "Daughter, your faith has saved you."

Today's readings address sickness and death. The first reading speaks of death entering the world at the hand of the devil. The Gospel features a dying girl and an ill woman. But sickness and death do not have the last word. Not with God, for God made us that we may have life. Both the girl and the woman are cured. Thus, we can sing, as we do in the psalm, "I will praise you, Lord, for you have rescued me."

LITURGY AND WORD

Today's Liturgy of the Word lays emphasis on the gift of life which serious illness or even death cannot nullify. The Book of Wisdom (1st Reading) teaches us that God neither created death, nor delights in the death of the living. If death and suffering exist in the world, the author says, they come from the devil, a force that is diametrically opposed to God. Another important lesson coming from the author of Wisdom is that God made human beings in the image of his own eternity and so human destiny is to reach God. The gospel of today is the actualization of the great insight of the Book of Wisdom. Evangelist Mark with his two healing stories makes it clear that those who approach God with faith, no matter how desperate their condition is, can rest assured that God has a remedy to their problems.

Mark begins with the story of Jairus' daughter, but halfway through the story he brings in the story of the woman with the flow of blood. Both stories involve women, one a young twelve-year-old girl, and the other a grown-up woman with an illness that began twelve years ago. The condition of both these women is quite hopeless. The woman with the flow of blood has spent all her money on physicians and medicines without getting any better. The young girl has actually died and now the parents and relatives can only cry to God. Jesus is the Son of God and divine power rests in him. He can heal the woman and resuscitate the girl. What matters is faith.

The woman's remark, "If I touch even his clothes, I shall be made well" speaks volumes for her extraordinary faith. After the cure, the woman comes forward, makes a gesture of respect to Jesus, and courageously tells the truth. She emerges as a woman of courage and initiative. She acts on hearsay about Jesus and pushes her way through the dense crowd. She is sustained by a hope that she can be 'saved", that is, both healed of her illness and able to resume a full life in community. Once she breaks through the physical barrier of the crowd and the social barrier of her ritual impurity and touches Jesus, her illness ceases and she senses the cure in her body. Having experienced the power of God in her own body, the woman approaches Jesus with the religious awe that arises from contact with the divine

LITURGY AND WORD Cont'd

In the case of Jairus, he falls at the feet of Jesus and expresses his complete confidence that Jesus has power to heal his daughter. Falling at the feet of someone is recognition of that person's authority. Jairus is thus one of the few persons with political power portrayed positively by Mark. Significantly, Jairus disregards his social status and humbles himself before Jesus, an attitude that is amply rewarded. When Jesus reaches the house of Jairus. he sends everyone out of the house except the parents of the girl and the three of his chosen disciples. Jesus then grasps the little girl's hands. As the woman with the flow of blood has been healed by touching Jesus' clock, here the girl is raised by his touch and speech. When Jesus tells her, "Girl, wake up," she gets up immediately and is also able to walk around. The response of the disciples is described in very strong terms, "they were immediately overcome with amazement." Their very strong reaction is appropriate in view of the unexpected and difficult character of the act of raising someone from the dead. The amazement is due to the manifestation of divine power. The raising of Jairus' daughter is for Mark's readers the prototype of their own hope that their God is a God not of the dead but of the living.
