24TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

INTRODUCTION TO THE LITURGY OF THE DAY!

FIRST READING: Isaiah 50:4c - 9a

Isaiah prophesied: I gave my back to those who beat me and my face to buffets and spitting. I was not disgraced, for when the Lord is with me, how can I be ashamed?

SECOND READING: James 2:14 - 18

Faith without good works is dead and worth nothing. A person should not claim to be Christian without living like one. In vain do we profess faith without practice.

GOSPEL READING: Mark 8:27 - 35

*Jesus taught the disciples that the Son of Man must suffer and die. He went on to say that if they wish to follow him they, too, must deny themselves and take up the cross.

Today's readings are challenging. Isaiah accepts God's call to prophecy, but he suffers terribly at the hands of his persecutors. St. James insists that Christians are obligated to put their faith into action, clothing and feeding the needy. In the Gospel, Jesus tells His disciples, "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me." As we listen to the readings, let us reflect on how we take up our cross and put our faith into action.

LITURGY AND WORD

The events described in the gospel

of today mark an important turning

point in the life of Jesus and his disciples (Mk 8:27-35). Jesus accompanied by his disciples arrives at Caesarea Philippi from where Jesus intends to make his final journey to Jerusalem. So far in the gospel, Mark has emphasized Jesus' authority as a wonderworker and a teacher. At the same time Mark has highlighted a series of misunderstandings and rejections that Jesus faced. These include the rejection by the Pharisees and the Herodians (3:6), Jesus' own family (3:21) and neighbours in Nazareth (6:1-6), and his own disciples (8:14-21). The purpose of the Marcan journey narrative in 8:27–10:45 is to clarify who Jesus is and what it means to become his disciple. The key to understanding Jesus properly will turn out to be the mystery of the cross: Jesus the healer and teacher is the suffering Messiah/Son of Man. Caesarea Philippi is located on the southern slope of Mount Hermon and near one of the sources of the river Jordan. Caesarea Philippi represents the northern tip of the land of Israel. The emperor Augustus had given the city to Herod the great. Herod's son Philip rebuilt the city and named it after the emperor and himself, thus Caesarea Philippi. There is also another city called Caesarea Maritima which is on the Mediterranean coast and we should keep the two cities apart. Perhaps Jesus has led his disciples to the former because it is a quiet place. Since it is situated on the very edge of the Jewish territory, he can still preach in villages without being mobbed by folks seeking healing. This is an area which is green and cool and is certainly one of the most beautiful parts of Palestine. In Caesarea Philippi, Jesus wants to know from his disciples what opinions people hold about him. Jesus is not happy with the answers that he is John the Baptist, or Elijah or one of the prophets. When he repeats the question, Peter comes out with the right answer that he is the Messiah. But something very essential is missing from Peter's understanding of the Messiah. Following Peter's confession, Jesus does two things. First, he impos-

es silence on his disciples openly

proclaiming that he is the Messiah.

Second, Jesus makes the first passion prediction. When Peter hears Jesus' prediction about his impending suffering and death he wants to dissuade Jesus from going to Jerusalem. "Son of man must suffer many things, and be rejected by the elders and the chief priests and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again," he tells Peter. Peter's objection to Jesus' suffering and death comes from his Jewish upbringing. The Jewish people has no notion of a suffering Messiah. Their understanding of the Messiah is one of triumph, not of suffering. They hope for a future Davidic king who will restore justice and the good fortunes of God's people. But Jesus is the suffering Messiah. It is through his suffering and gruesome death on the cross that he will save his people. Jesus then teaches them a tesson on discipleship. Anyone who wishes to follow him should be ready to take up his own cross and follow him. Why does Jesus forbid his disciples from proclaiming that Jesus is the Messiah? For two reasons, first, because people must find this out for themselves with the help of God who reveals the truth about his Son. Second, because they must understand what sort of a Messiah Jesus is. He is not to be a spectacular and outwardly successful hero, driving out the hated Roman rulers and setting up a Jewish state, as many hoped. Instead, he is to be a humble, patient, loving, peaceful Messiah, God's suffering servant, as pictured in Isaiah 50:5-9 (First Reading).
