INTRODUCTION TO THE LITURGY OF THE DAY!

The healing of the blind man from Jericho is the last healing miracle recorded in the Gospel of Mark. The healing of Bartimaeus and his response to Jesus are vividly told in the gospel of today. His actions when called by Jesus are fascinating. He throws his outer garment aside, leaps to his feet, and rushes in his eagerness to be healed. Mark by habit does not record the names of people whom Jesus has healed. But he makes an exception to this rule by mentioning the names Jairus, whose daughter was healed (Mk 5:22) and "Bartimaeus." The fact that Mark records the name of the blind beggar implies that he became a full-fledged disciple who was well known in the early Church. The healing of Bartimaeus is a miracle story but it is also a testimony about faith. Bartimaeus is blind yet he displays prophetic insight. He is not asking for alms, but his sight to be restored and gets even more than he asks for. Bartimaeus emerges as an exemplar of faith in Jesus and seems to have accepted Jesus' invitation to become his disciple. The cure of Bartimaeus takes place on the last lap of Jesus' Journey to Jerusalem. But Mark records the cure of a blind man also at the beginning of the Journey (Mk 8:22-26). By comparing the two healings, we come to know the purpose of these miracles. The healing of the blind man of Bethsaida is a gradual healing. The first stage in the healing $(8:2\overline{3}-24)$ involves a complex ritual and takes place outside of Bethsaida. The result is a partial restoration of the man's sight so that he can distinguish humans from trees insofar as the former walk about. The second stage (8:25) brings about a full restoration of the man's sight. The episode ends not with the amazement of the crowd or a proclamation by the man who has been healed, but rather with Jesus sending him home and commanding him not to enter the village. Whereas Bartimaeus displays amazing faith in Jesus. He addresses Jesus as Son of David. This indicates that Bartimaeus recognizes Jesus as

the Messiah. He is instantly healed of his illness on account of his faith. He becomes a follower of Jesus. By placing the healing of the blind man of Bethsaida at the beginning of the Journey, Mark has imbued the story of the gradual giving of sight to the blind man with symbolic or spiritual value. It will take time for Mark's readers to absorb the idea of Jesus as the suffering Messiah. Indeed, the disciples who are the immediate audience for Jesus' teaching on the way do not "get it" until after Jesus' death and resurrection.

Throughout the journey narrative we will come to see more clearly the mystery of the cross – Jesus' death and resurrection – in the life of Jesus and in the life of those who follow him. Whereas the man of Mark 8:22-26 is healed gradually and told not to go into his village, Bartimaeus makes a confession of faith in Jesus as the Son of David, is cured instantly and completely, and follows Jesus on "the way" towards Jerusalem. Although blind, Bartimaeus possesses unparalleled insight into the working of God. He demonstrates an insight into the person of Jesus and his mission which the crowd that follow him and the close disciples lack. Barimaeus stands tall as a person of perseverance and faith.
